



All participants reminded to wash their hands after the session. All participants reminded not to put their fingers/hands in their mouths/on their faces. Check skin for ticks, if required.		Low

	Plants/Trees/Soil	Plants that are not to be touched to be highlighted (with visuals) to adults and children during H&S talk at beginning of session. Plants also pointed out in habitat. Agree not to eat any plant found. There are bluebells on site- be very aware in Spring. Yew trees present- make aware of berries in Autumn. Trees are monitored and treated appropriately. Areas of concern are roped off to prevent access. Trees and branches monitored and cut and cleared when needed. Area assessed after high winds. Sessions cancelled, and participants informed if high winds and storms forecast. Cuts and broken skin (including eczema) are covered to prevent infection. Adults are aware of risks.			Low
